ORCHIDS WE SHOULD ALL GROW

ONCIDIUM SPHACELATUM

No matter what you collect, as long as you have an ample space, you need an *Onc. sphacelatum*. to provide you with a spectacular and floriferous reminder that spring is here!

Unlike most manageable, pot-sized oncidiums, *Onc. sphacelatum*. is a space-filler. Whether grown in a clay pot or mounted, it will soon become a specimen-sized monster.

The flower is typical in shape for an oncidium, with a predominantly bright yellow color highlighted with chestnut brown. Flowers are smallish, only about 1-1 ¼" in width, but their size is offset by the large number of flowers it produces. A plant awarded an AM/AOS in Tampa had over 1700 blooms. Another, awarded a CCM/AOS in Ohio, had over 3500!



The pseudobulb is typically 8-10" long, somewhat flat and oval-shaped. Leaves can be up to 30" long and are narrow, less than 1" wide. Inflorescences can be up to 4' long and branch readily.

Onc. sphacelatum. is found throughout Central America, from Mexico to Venezuela. It typically grows as an epiphyte, but is occasionally found as a terrestrial growing in humus. It is a forest dweller, usually found in low lying areas seldom over 500' in elevation.

Taking all this into consideration, one would expect *Onc. sphacelatum*. to be a warm grower that loves moisture. Although that's true, it is also a very tolerant and adaptable plant. It grows best when it's kept warm and moist under filtered, bright light but it will even survive the "Oops, I forgot to bring it in" lament when it falls below 35 degrees at night in the winter.

It is adaptable to pot culture (clay is best), but also thrives when mounted. The plant pictured above is mounted on a piece of 6"x 8" tree fern. Tree fern seems to work better than cork or cedar slats because the roots can intertwine and grow through the fibers to help support it.

Grow it moist and fertilize it on a regular basis when it's in active growth. Cut back on the fertilizer in winter and water less frequently, but don't forget it entirely.

A word on fertilizing in Florida -- our plants often continue to grow all winter long, but at a slower pace. Cutting back on fertilizer doesn't mean stopping, but rather reducing the dosage to perhaps 25% of your normal weekly application. Skipping a week is okay, but remember that even when we are sluggish, we still like to eat occasionally.

The plant pictured grows outside on an arbor and gets direct sun in the morning and late afternoon. Midday sun is filtered by oak and hickory trees. It is watered daily in growing season and fertilized weekly with a balanced 13-2-13 fertilizer supplemented with CalMag. Once a month, it receives Potassium Nitrate and Mag Sulfate.

As blooming season approaches, the plant moves into the pool cage so it can be enjoyed constantly. When the first bloom falls, it gets moved back out to the arbor because it gets messy when it sheds 500-1000 small blooms.

2014 Wild Orchid Man Adventures in Bhutan

During my annual Wild Orchid Man (WOM) tour to Bhutan, in April-May of 2014, my main focus was to find lady slipper orchids (*Paphiopedilum* and *Cypripedium* species). There are three species of *Paphiopedilum* historically reported from Bhutan, although only two localities are presently known, as well as five species of *Cypripedium*, all growing on the ground or on limestone rocks in seasonally very wet areas. My intention was to make an inventory of known plant sites of these delightful orchids, hopefully discover new populations, and identify any potential environmental threats in their habitat due to planned road construction and/or power line installations which require the cutting back of vegetation, and unfortunately, negatively affect the biodiversity.

The weather was damp with frequent showers when our team, consisting of Nima Gyeltshen, Choki Gyeltshen, Dupchu Wangdi from the National Biodiversity Centre (NBC) in Serbithang, Thimphu, and I left the capitol in early May. We set off to the south, towards the Indian border, and more specifically the Royal Manas National Park. The weather and the roads became increasingly soggy as we approached the little village of Panbang. It seemed like the summer monsoon had arrived early again! Apparently, the daily (and nightly) heavy rains began the same day the team left Thimphu. Villagers informed us that the narrow road that leads to the desirable limestone areas had been blocked by landslides and was now impassable for the season. We had several unappealing alternatives to consider. Walk through heavy torrential rainfall for three hours, possibly photograph some plants that probably would not be in bloom at this time of the year anyway, and return to Panbang through another three hours of cold rain, possibly in darkness. Or we could wait in Panbang, and hope for the rain to hold up, or the road to be cleared, which might not happen until September. Our team decided to leave Panbang and head north again, while there remained a functioning 'escape road,' and search for drier areas to explore.

As it turned out, our quest for *Paphiopedilum* species was thoroughly unsuccessful, and the search for *Cypripedium* species just marginally better. We only succeeded in finding green tips that were barely above ground, and one single plant in bud. We shifted our focus to other types of orchids, which I'm happy to report, turned out remarkably successful. We documented several new species for Bhutan.
